

| <image/> <image/> <text><text><text><text><text></text></text></text></text></text> | 07-08-2024, 06:36 AM #1319 Dave, I haven't seen any wide cobblestone material in an "American" pattern, but I have seen some nicely made cobblestone paving done with plaster, spackle, joint compound and air-dry modeling clay #1600 The cobblestones were made using an old small paint brush. The hairs were pulled out of the ferrule and the metal ferrule was squeezed into a rectanglular shape the size of a cobblestone. That tool pressed the stone shape into the damp plaster. The modeller said it went faster than it sounds and they could easily customized the pattern to follow along side tracks or gutters at the edge of streets. Here's a link to a 5 minute video of Martin Tärnrot (Marklin of Sweden) making a cobblestone path. He used a roller with a cobblestone pattern on air-dry clay https://www.modelrailroadacademy.come-path-017252/. The roller is faster than the paintbrush tool but more limited in what it can do.
